RE: Docket No. CP15-558-000 - PennEast Pipeline Draft EIS

In PennEast's Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS), Volume 1, Page 4-130 " **Planned Developments** " states that:

"Local and county government planning officials were contacted to identify planned residential, commercial, and industrial developments within 0.25 mile of the proposed Project facilities. Publicly available website and public comments received by FERC were also reviewed during the planning and survey process. Planned developments identified within 0.25 mile of the Project are described in table 4.7.3-1."

Kingwood Township, nor its Planning Board were "contacted to identify planned residential, commercial, and industrial developments within 0.25 mile of the proposed Project facilities." If they were, it would have been noted that on Block 20 - Lot 11 there is a 7 house subdivision planned and approved. This property is less than .25 miles from the proposed pipeline. On Block 23 Lot 11 there is a planned and approved 14 house subdivision which the pipeline goes directly through.

Chairman Bay, this is just another in a long line of false statements by PennEast. All of the information pertaining to subdivisions in Kingwood Township are publically available on its website. Given the number of gaps in data and omissions required to construct a safe pipeline with no or minimal impacts to the communities it passes through, I am requesting that the entire **DEIS** be resubmitted at a time when these issues will have been resolved and any decision on the status of the pipeline project be held until that time.

The health, safety and welfare of our communities is too important to risk it for the monetary enhancement of a few individuals.
