

Open Communication and Transparency: Critical in Local Government

The Township Committee and professional staff recognize the importance of open communication and transparency and have prioritized initiatives to ensure a diversity of communication channels, so all residents can be reached across mediums.

The Township Committee and professional staff remain steadfast in our commitment to open communication and transparency. We've prioritized a series of initiatives and enhancements to ensure that residents are informed and engaged through a variety of communication channels.

Recent Communication Enhancements



As a part of this commitment there have been several significant enhancements over the past two years to ensure regular, open communications. These include:

- **Introduction of Hybrid Meetings.** In 2022 the Township Committee adopted hybrid meetings, which allows residents to fully participate in meetings, including public comment, whether they are physically at the Municipal Building, via Zoom from their computer, or from their phone. While Township Committee meetings have always been broadcast on local television and videos posted online, the technology investments made to support fully hybrid meetings ensures greater accessibility to residents. Since the introduction of hybrid meetings, we've been thrilled to see an increase in attendance and participation.

- **Introduction of Township Email Newsletter.** In our first *Town Crier* of 2023, I shared that a Township email newsletter was coming. Every home in the U.S. is eligible to order an additional 4 free at-home tests as of November 20. If you did not order tests this fall, place two orders for a total of 8 tests.

Creating New Trail and Recreation Amenities in Hopewell Valley: #LoveWhereYouLive



This past month, the Township Committee authorized final engineering and funding for one of two unfinished segments of the Lawrence Hopewell Trail in Hopewell. It is so gratifying to see the vision of LHT co-founders Becky Taylor and Eleanor Horne, for this 22-mile loop connecting Hopewell Township and Lawrence Township, come to fruition!

The LHT trail is a tremendous example of what's possible when local government cooperates with private corporations and the community in a public-private partnership. Together, we've created a wonderful new recreational resource for the community and made Hopewell Valley a more walkable and bikeable community. But our work is not yet done!

Beyond completing these last LHT trail segments, we now must look ahead and create a vision for what comes next. Within Hopewell Valley, we will be working to create new neighborhood access for pedestrians and bicyclists to the LHT trail. We are partnering with the County and neighboring municipalities on our "Complete Streets" program, which will create dedicated bike lanes from the D&R Canal to the east side of Mercer County. This will include a new signalized crossing to help people (and motorists) safely cross Route 31.

Additionally, we will be partnering with local land trusts and environmental organizations to broaden access to local nature preserves and open space. This includes new programs with the D&R Greenway, Watershed Institute, New Jersey Conservation Foundation and Friends of Hopewell Valley Open Space, to name just a few. I am personally excited that plans are underway for a new "Planets" trail (future location and starting point to be announced) and that we are will be increasing trail access up to the preserve at Baldpate Mountain. Science shows that there is a measurable health benefit to getting outdoors and enjoying all Nature has to offer. It's one of the reasons

our family was first attracted to Hopewell Valley over twenty years ago, and our expansive park and open space network is a benefit to all residents.

Looking ahead, we will continue to analyze opportunities to preserve additional land, with a focus on enhancing and connecting existing blocks of preserved land and protecting areas being actively farmed. But with 43% of Hopewell Township land already preserved as farmland and open space or reserved for outdoor recreation, there may be a limit to how much we can preserve. Accordingly, we are going to also focus on how we can increase access to existing preserved lands and maintain the trails that have been built. This will include new parking lots with pervious pavement or gravel at key trailheads, the new neighborhood connections referenced above, and ongoing work to upgrade and maintain existing trails.

Recently we met with representatives from Township-based recreational leagues and other community partners, to understand their future needs for additional fields and indoor recreation facilities. I am excited to announce that we will be upgrading our turf field this winter at Twin Pines. We are also exploring the potential of a second turf field at the Municipal Athletic Complex (MAC). With these enhancements, we are looking at more efficient LED lighting options and at the addition of outdoor shelters/picnic areas and improved restroom access at both fields. Second, we are looking at the addition of new outdoor fields at the newly acquired properties off of Scotch Road and the potential expansion of pickle ball courts at the MAC. Members of the community have recently asked us to consider a new cricket field – it's a growing sport both in the US and internationally, and we look forward to exploring the possibilities. Finally, we are investigating public-private partnerships that could help us bring new indoor turf, basketball courts and other facilities to the Township. While still in the planning stages, I am excited about the potential of these new recreation amenities.

Hopewell Valley's trail network and extensive recreation amenities are a real asset to our community, and another reason for us all to #LoveWhereYouLive. Hopewell Township Renews its Bronze Sustainable Jersey Certification

Hopewell Township has been proudly participating in the Sustainable Jersey certification program since the program was first introduced by the New Jersey Environmental Commission in 2009. The certification program, which includes a rigorous review, is a prestigious designation for municipal governments in New Jersey. We are thrilled to share that in 2023 Hopewell Township received our Bronze certification.

The Sustainable Jersey Bronze certification is a joint effort by the Hopewell Township Committee, Hopewell Township Environmental Commission, and Hopewell Valley Green team. This designation is a true testament to our collective commitment to building a sustainable community that is beneficial for current residents and for generations to come.

As a part of this process Hopewell Township put together a framework to build a sustainable community that will thrive into the next century, save tax dollars, ensure clean land, air, and water, and improve working and living environments. Some examples include:

- Water conservation element and innovative and stringent stormwater management requirements guidelines with the Hopewell Township Master plan to balance the groundwater recharge.
- Solar panels for the Township's Public Works building as well as retrofitting the lighting in all the municipal buildings, which has already begun.
- An adoptions of the Sustainable Land Use pledge and a commitment to new land use ordinances to mandate sustainable design considerations for all new land development projects.

In all, Hopewell Township has dedicated almost 43% of the land to recreation, open space, and conservation. And there so many more activities that support sustainability.

For example, the Township's Public Works department conducts electronic recycling and hazardous waste collection as well as paper shredding events to help reduce waste going to landfills, toxic leachates, and greenhouse gas emissions. Additionally, the Township recently built five electric vehicle public charging stations at the Municipal building, including one that is handicapped accessible. The charging stations are accessible to the public 24 hours/7 days per week and do not require municipal approval or account. The Township also purchased hybrid vehicles which are environmentally friendly and projected to save thousands of dollars in gas costs.

Hopewell Township administers smoke and tobacco-free workplaces and actively works with the Hopewell Valley Municipal Alliance (HVMA), a volunteer organization with representatives from various community sectors to promote positive youth development. HVMA's activities include programming on smoking and vaping education and outreach, social media outreach, and providing educational resources. Furthermore, the Health Department distributes the Social Support Resources brochure at local events which includes resources for tobacco, vaping, and cannabis cessation.

The Township participates in the prescription medicine disposable program and has installed a box at the township building to securely dispose of unused and/or expired prescription medicine to prevent improper disposal that could contaminate the waterways with harmful chemicals.

The Hopewell Township Environmental Commission along with the Hopewell Valley Green Team offers educational materials and a range of product options that encourage residents to adopt sustainable practices and support the government's initiative to reduce green gas emissions, reduce and recycle waste, and promote public health as well as economic health for Hopewell Valley residents.

The Township Committee would like to extend our sincere appreciation to the members of the Environmental Commission and the Hopewell Valley Green team for their unwavering support during this process. We also would like to recognize the tremendous efforts of Hopewell Township staff, who were instrumental throughout this process to track the progress of the application and fulfill the requirements in a timely manner.

We are committed to continuous work on sustainability efforts! We wish to continue to work on sustainability initiatives and aspire to achieve the Silver Certification by next year!
